## SWAZILAND'S HIV/AIDS HISTORY

(ACCORDING TO THE SWAZILAND REFORMED CHURCH)

In 1986, the first three people who tested positive for HIV were found in Swaziland. A year later, the three had increased to 10 and one person had full-blown AIDS.

After five years (1991) there were 584 people who were HIV positive, 62 with full-blown AIDS and 43 people had already died due to AIDS-related illnesses.

Swaziland has a population of approximately 1.2 million. If the 42.6 per cent of pregnant women who are HIV positive should be a fairly accurate indication of the total population who are HIV positive, then it means that more than 400 000 people have this disease at the moment.

In the Swaziland newspapers, where notice is given of the death of people, sometimes more than two pages are used up by these notices. Often, a photo is also included with the notice.

With the exception of a few of those who had died, most of the photos are of young people, in the prime of their lives, who had died. Everybody knows the cause of their death, even though it is never mentioned.


Among the pregnant women that were tested recently, it was found that more than 42 per cent of those between the ages of 20-24 were HIV positive. "We believe the church has a specific role to play," reads the church's website.

"The church cannot do research on new vaccines. The church cannot take over the role of doctors and nurses. However, we believe, as Christians, we have the task to comfort these people, in the same way that Christ would have done, and to bring to those who are dying and to their family members, a message of hope, not only of the everlasting life in Jesus Christ, but also that we care about them while they are still alive."

# NO 'BLING' IN THIS CHURCH

- No salaries for Board members but more assistance for the needy



According to Arnau van Wyngaard, Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of the church, these include those who are suffering from the effects of HIV/AIDS, the impoverished, orphans and those who have no voice of their own.

Presently, almost 1 200 volunteers (meaning that they receive no salary, including every single Board member) are part of Shiselweni Home-Based Care.

They reach almost 4 500 people per month, feed 400 OVCS daily, run four preschools and further hand out wheelchairs to invalids who would otherwise have been forced to spend the remainder of their lives in a bed.

Van Wyngaard said that these caregivers have received even meagre amount of £500 per month for their work, it would have cost more than £7 million per year.

"If this congregation does this work because they truly believe that this is what Jesus would have done if He had been physically living on earth today," he said.

On the church's official website, Wyngaard said after serving in Swaziland for 21 years in the Shiselweni congregation of the Swaziland Reformed Church, they were privileged when God called their congregation, in 2006, to follow a new vision, which was to reach out to those suffering from HIV/AIDS. "What started as a small group of people, passionately caring for the sick and the dying, gradually grew

on the website.

"One of the things which we are extremely proud of, is the way in which we handle our finances. It is generally considered that up to 30 per cent of expenses in an NGO may be used for administration and overheads. In the 2013/2014 financial year, less than one per cent of our total expenses were used for administrative purposes while 70 per cent was spent on our four focus areas.

"Any individual or organisation contributing financially towards this work can, therefore, be assured that their money will be used responsibly, will not be spent on luxury items and will reach the people for whom it was intended – those suffering from HIV and AIDS and the people taking care of them."

the HIV/AIDS issue is in Swaziland, Wyngaard said: "This is an extremely difficult question to answer. Frankly, no one knows for sure. What we do know, is that we are dealing with the most serious health problem in the history of Swaziland. Statistics about AIDS are not accurate and usually reflect a much more positive picture than is really the

case. However, the government is trying its utmost to find accurate statistics regarding the position about AIDS in Swaziland.

"All indications are that more than 30 per cent of the population in Swaziland is HIV positive. Large numbers of people are dying daily because of AIDS-related illnesses. We do not have access to accurate statistics indicating the number of people dying due to AIDS-related illnesses but all over Swaziland, our church members are saying people are dying at a rate that they have never experienced in the history of Swaziland.

"In a recent survey, it was found that in 60 per cent of homes in a certain area, someone had died in the previous 12 months. Most of them died as a direct result of AIDS. According to the latest census indica-

tions, more than 10 per cent of the total population consists of or-

phans - that is 115 000 orphans."
